Church Family,

I am a big fan of the C.S. Lewis books, The Chronicles of Narnia. Every book is so wonderfully written and applicable to real life. In that series, Lewis writes in allegory. Allegory is when you write a story with characters in it that represent real life figures. If you are familiar with the books or the movies then you know that the Jesus figure is an enormous lion. It is masterfully represented. One of my favorite lines is about Aslan, who is the Lion (who represents Jesus in the story). The children are in Narnia and have yet to meet Aslan face to face, and Mr. Beaver is explaining to them about him: "Aslan is a lion - the lion, the Great Lion." "Ooh", said Susan. "I'd thought he was a man. Is he - quite safe? I shall feel rather nervous about meeting a lion".... "Safe?" said Mr. Beaver... "Who said anything about safe? 'course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the King, I tell you."

I've always loved how C.S. Lewis characterizes Aslan as Jesus. That's an impossible task really. The real Jesus is an infinite Being of truth and power. Colossians tell us that He is the image of the invisible God and that all things were created by Him and for Him and that in Him all things are held together. He is pre-eminent. In other words, we really don't have a clue. This is an issue that is beyond our imagination. We simply do not have the bandwidth to comprehend Him. While He was on the earth, His Glory was covered by a cloak of humility that He wore. The only time He took it off was on the Mount of Transfiguration. Matthew 17:2 (NASB) says that: "...His face shone like the sun, and His garments became as white as *light."* Wow, what an amazing thing to witness! The Bible tells us the disciples present were terrified after God the Father's voice spoke. It's just sensory overload for the human soul.

I have become too familiar with Jesus.

Be My Humble Valentine!

Valentine's Day is often associated with love, but as believers, we know that true love is more than chocolates and cards. It's an action, a way of life, and most importantly, a reflection of humility. Genuine love, as demonstrated by Christ, produces humility. In fact, humility is one of love's most beautiful attributes, showing itself through unselfishness, servanthood, sacrifice, and putting others' needs before our own.

Unselfishness-

Unselfishness is the foundation of humility. The Apostle Paul writes, *"Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself."* (Philippians 2:3, NKJV) This kind of humility is a direct product of love—it thinks less about personal gain and more about others' well-being. It is not about belittling ourselves but elevating others, a mindset that honors Christ and points people to Him. am hearing from the Lord and I do see some things in my life that must change. Isaiah 66:2 (NASB) says, "But to this one I will look, to him who is humble and contrite of Spirit, and who trembles at my word."

I am hearing the Lion of the Tribe of Judah's roar from a great distance. He is calling for me to come close. I feel called to consume the Word like I never have before. Please pray for me that I gain the eye of the tiger and that I tremble before His Word. He is not a tame lion. He is an all consuming fire.

Becoming a Servant-

Humility also manifests through servanthood. Jesus said, "The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life а ransom for many." (Matthew 20:28, NKJV) When we follow Christ's example of serving others, we reflect His love. Whether it's helping a neighbor in need, encouraging a friend, or volunteering time for others, serving is an act of humility that makes Christ's love visible.

Putting Others First-

The love that produces humility also involves prioritizing others over ourselves. In Philippians 2:4, Paul exhorts us, *"Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others."* (NKJV) When we consider others' needs ahead of our own, we practice the kind of selfless love that builds relationships and glorifies God.

Sacrifice-

Finally, humility is most vividly displayed in sacrifice. Jesus demonstrated this on the cross, as Paul reminds us: "And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross." (Philippians 2:8, NKJV) True love is sacrificial—it gives without expecting anything in return. Whether it's sacrificing time, resources, or comfort, humility modeled after Christ is willing to give for the sake of others.

Humility Through the Holy Spirit-

While humility is essential to living out Christ-like love, it is not something we can achieve on our own. Jesus said, "Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me." (John 15:4, NKJV) Through obedience to His Word and the work of the Holy Spirit, we are empowered to love in ways that produce true humility.

This Valentine's Day, let's look beyond fleeting tokens of affection and focus on the humility that comes from Christ-like love. Be a humble Valentine by serving, sacrificing, and putting others first. When we allow the Holy Spirit to shape our hearts, we reflect the love of Christ to a world desperately in need of it.

May we embrace the prayer of John 3:30: *"He must increase, but I must decrease"* (NKJV), and may our lives shine with the humility of Christ's love.

Acts 16:6b and 7b 6b. ...having been forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word in Asia. 7b. ... but the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them.

We see an interesting picture of the working of the Spirit in these two verses. Paul, accompanied by Timothy and Silas, was engaged in what we call his second missionary journey. He was revisiting many of the churches he and Barnabas had planted on his first journey. Paul then planned on journeying into the province of Asia, but as verse 6b indicates, the Spirit forbids Paul and his team from going to Asia. Then they attempted to travel north to Bithynia, but the Spirit again would not allow them to make that trip (7b). Paul and his team headed to Troas where they would realize why the Spirit had halted their efforts.

We could use the phrase they "wound up in Troas," (verse 8), but I think that would not accurately describe how they found themselves in Troas. In Troas, Paul has a vision at night of a man from Macedonia, Greece, urging him to "come over to Macedonia and help us" (verse 9). What is interesting and imaginative is it appears Paul connected to Luke, who was from Greece, and the author of Acts in Troas. In addition to directing Paul to Macedonia, which much was accomplished for the sake of the gospel during his visit there, he also encountered Luke, who would journey with Paul on the rest of his mission. As the author of Acts, the personal pronoun changes from "they" in verses 6-8 to "we" in verse 10, indicating Paul met Luke right after the vision of verse 9. Was meeting Luke, a Greek, affirmation to Paul of his mission to Macedonia?

So, all the redirecting and changing of Paul's plans by the Spirit had significant reasons and purposes. Paul's call to Macedonia spread the gospel and Christianity into Europe and the Western world and connected Paul with the author of the Gospel of Luke and of Acts. We have at our reading pleasure these two books by the leading of the Spirit who connected Luke and Paul in Troas.

You may be asking what this has to do with our TIM ministry. Do not be surprised that as the Spirit continues to lead TABC through this transitional period we may think we are going in one direction and He may forbid that direction and/or redirect us in another direction. Are you ready and willing to follow Him as Paul and his team followed? We all know the path of the Spirit is the path we want to tread, not the path that we envision.

Let us all continue to praise the Lord for His and the Spirit's work in guiding and leading each of us as we seek to accomplish Their mission for TABC of making disciples who make disciples for Christ, D2D.

It's basketball time here at TACA! Basketball season brings excitement to our campus. It is always fun to watch the players on the court and the fans in the stands. In order for the season to be a success and run smoothly, many volunteers are needed. We are blessed with volunteers that coach, collect gate money, run the concession stand, keep the scorebook, run the scoreboard, live stream games, set up before games, and help clean up after games. We are so thankful for the army of volunteers who are willing to serve.

Basketball seasons vary from year to year. This year we have three teams which consist of middle school boys, middle and high school girls, and a Junior Varsity High school boys' team. These players have been working hard in the classroom and on the basketball court.

As with any ministry of the church, the sports program is dependent on donations to be successful. The TACA basketball teams have been blessed this season through donations from several families. Each team is sporting new uniforms this year because of the generosity of those families. In addition, a family donated an IPAD so we can livestream our home games as well as some of our away games. Live Streaming these games allows for working parents, grandparents, church members, and others who wish to watch the ability to do so. The games are live streamed through YouTube under TACA Athletics.

Our players not only work hard in the classroom and spend countless hours practicing for games and playing in those games, but some of the older students also volunteer their time every Saturday morning for the TABC Recreation League. This six-week program is designed to help students in Kindergarten through 6th grade build their foundational skills in basketball. The TACA basketball players work closely with the participants by leading drills, coaching, refereeing, keeping the clock, and even doing devotions.

To say we are blessed with a great group of students is an understatement. These students work together to become better teammates and to set a Godly example for those they encounter on and off the court. This league gives us the opportunity to "make disciples who make disciples."

Our basketball players and coaches appreciate the support of the TACA families, Academy staff and teachers, and TABC.
